LOCAL OPTION SALES TAX (LOST)



SUMMARY

Coralville, Iowa City, and North Liberty City
Councils have all chosen to put a 1% Local
Option Sales Tax (LOST) on the ballot this fall.
LOST applies to most taxable goods and
services, but does not affect the cost of many
basic necessities: groceries, rent and
mortgage payments, utilities, gasoline, or
prescription drugs. It requires a majority of
voters to vote "yes" to pass.

State law requires that half of local option sales tax revenue go toward property tax relief. Our city councils, informed by community feedback and their strategic plans, have chosen specific priorities for the remaining revenue, which is outlined in their ballot language.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Greater lowa City, Inc. supports the addition of a local option sales tax as a way for cities to diversify revenue sources and capture visitor spending and encourages voters to vote "Yes." The 50% allocation for property tax relief allows cities to pursue important capital projects without needing to increase property tax rates to pay for them. It also provides for local control and lets each city choose how to use the funds to meet their strategic priorities.

CORALVILLE

Summary: To authorize imposition of a local sales and services tax in the City of Coralville, lowa at the rate of one percent (1%) to be effective from July 1, 2026.

A local sales and services tax shall be imposed in the City of Coralville, Iowa at the rate of one percent (1%) to be effective from July 1, 2026.

Revenues from the sales and services tax shall be allocated as follows:

50% for property tax relief

The specific purposes for which the revenues shall otherwise be expended are:

Capital projects, including but not limited to, the recreation center project, parks, trails, and other projects identified from time to time in the City's capital improvements plan, for programs and initiatives that increase affordable housing supply and support neighborhood reinvestment projects, home improvement and home renovation grants, rental rehabilitation, and other housing projects designated by City Council.

LOCAL OPTION SALES TAX (LOST)



IOWA CITY

Summary: To authorize imposition of a local option sales and services tax in the City of lowa City, lowa, at the rate of one percent (1%) to be effective on July 1, 2026.

A local option sales and services tax shall be imposed in the City of Iowa City, Iowa, at the rate of one percent (1%) to be effective on July 1, 2026.

Revenues from the sales and services tax shall be allocated as follows:
50% for property tax relief; and

The specific purposes for which the revenues shall otherwise be expended are: 25% to preserve existing affordable housing stock, increase shelter, transitional, and permanent housing supports, and increase access to and the supply of affordable housing for households with low incomes.

10% for maintenance and construction of public streets, sidewalks, trails, parks, and facilities as designated by City Council.
15% for community partnerships, including, but not limited to, partnerships that support intergovernmental, economic development, arts and culture, and social service priorities as designated by City Council.

NORTH LIBERTY

Summary: To authorize imposition of a local sales and services tax in the City of North Liberty, Iowa at the rate of one percent (1%) to be effective starting July 1, 2026.

A local sales and services tax shall be imposed in the City of North Liberty, Iowa at the rate of one percent (1%) to be effective starting July 1, 2026.

Revenues from the sales and services tax shall be allocated and expended as follows:

50% for Property Tax Relief; and

50% for capital projects, including but not limited to, fire stations, community center upgrades, parks, trails, and other projects identified in the City's Capital Improvements Plan; and for programs and initiatives that increase affordable housing supply and support neighborhood reinvestment projects, home improvement/renovation grants, rental rehabilitation, and other housing projects designated by City Council.

Consistency requires structured processes with clear criteria and measurable outcomes. I propose adapting Stage Gate methodology for evaluating incentives and development proposals.

How Stage Gates Work: Projects advance through checkpoints where stakeholders demonstrate they've met specific criteria before proceeding.

- Gate 1 Concept Review: Developer/business presents proposal. Council evaluates against clear criteria: job creation targets, wage levels, community benefit, fiscal impact. Decision: proceed to feasibility or decline.
- Gate 2 Feasibility: Detailed analysis of proposal viability, market demand, infrastructure requirements. Financial pro forma reviewed. Decision: authorize negotiations or require modifications.
- Gate 3 Agreement Terms: Finalized contract with measurable milestones tied to incentive disbursement. Performance bonds if appropriate. Decision: approve agreement or renegotiate.

In this next term I would like to see at least one more housing-first apartment complex and increase supportive housing for the most vulnerable. We must also build up housing stock for first-time home owners and workforce. With more affordable apartments, townhouses, and single-family homes in Iowa City, people will be more likely to stay in Iowa City for their essential goods and entertainment.

Another priority is to continue solving for more affordable quality childcare in the IC area. A lack of childcare negatively impacts an entire community in several ways, but for the business community this gap impacts recruiting, hiring, and retention of workers. Your question's phrasing contains at least part of the answer. Future councils need to be consistent and explicit in signaling their priorities up front, and then council should not pull late-stage shifts if the criteria for incentives or development rights, etc. have been met. Iowa City has developed a reputation for such actions. For years, I have heard that IC is difficult to work with from the business community perspective. I am proud that we expect our business partners to fit with our values, such as accordances for affordable housing, to contribute to positive climate action, and for showing right-fit in the neighborhood and community (whether development or business). However, where Councils have been less helpful to the process is when we shift the goals posts, so to speak. While we do not want to rubberstamp major decisions like business or development agreements without knowing final details, we must also recognize that the process of getting to yes has many steps along the way. As one example of how Council has been able to shape future process and signal our needs for a good partnership, we recently re-worked the language of our TIF agreement documentation. It is clear and also allows room for future improvements and innovations to our standards. We need to stand by the very expectations we create so that potential partners can feel confident that our asks are solid.

The City can also provide tax abatements, small business grants, and climate action grants, and we have existing façade and program grants. I believe incentives can be an appropriate tool when used strategically. They should be tied to clear outcomes that benefit the broader community: expanded housing options, new small businesses, infrastructure improvements, or increased walkability. Public dollars should be measured against public impact, with accountability built in so residents see the return on investment.
